EXECUTIVE NEWS

For those who have been lucky enough to spend some time watching their favourite teams play they would have also been able to watch firsthand the incredible coverage of the recent tragic events of the natural disasters which occurred in both New Zealand and Japan. Our hearts really go out to those victims of those terrible earthquakes or tsunamis and subsequent loss of absolutely everything they have worked for and built up in their whole lives. Our prayers are certainly with them all, especially with damaged nuclear reactors and the possibility of a serious nuclear threat on top of everything else. We continue with our efforts to come up with an amicable resolution to this disaster which has struck the agricultural industry in Zimbabwe.

Back here in Zimbabwe what we are finding at the moment is that the disruptions, threats, prosecutions and insecurity to farming operations are continuing, although not as much as before, obviously because there are only a very few farmers left out there who are still able to produce. However, the threat continues and of concern at the moment is that a larger number of the threats to acquire property and agricultural business is being brought in the form of indigenisation by forcing new partners. This is particularly prevalent in the surviving conservancies, which have a fairly high percentage of their owners falling under international Bilateral Investment Promotion and Protection Agreements.

However, we have not given up and we are determined to keep pushing the Way Forward proposal as hard as we can and at the same time to look for more avenues to assist those who are still on the ground financially. We already have a number of schemes already in place and we are constantly looking for, and developing more. You can find out more by contacting Richard Taylor of our newly formed Business section. We fully recognise that the biggest threat to current farmers, apart from the security of tenure, is the rising cost of production, which is where we are making efforts to assist farmers to combat this where ever we possibly can.

Fertiliser and Crop Chemicals

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UPDATE ON ZETDC – THE FORMATION OF WHEAT FARMING CLUSTERS

(From the desk of Marc Carrie-Wilson)

This is a must read for those farmers who are considering growing a crop which will require irrigation in the coming winter season. Once again I interrupt the series of articles on viability challenges to give an important update on electricity supply.

Today the President and I were invited to a meeting at ZESA head office to discuss the modalities of ensuring a guaranteed and reliable supply of electricity to farmers in the coming winter season. In order to ensure that you are supplied with guaranteed electricity we need to compile a list which indicates the following:

This list must be submitted to ZETDC by no later than Monday the 28th of March in order to plan for prioritised grids.

Other issues discussed were as following:

Bill Payments and payment arrears:

The General Manger of ZETDC reported that from the Mashonaland provinces alone there are outstanding bills in respect of the Commercial Farming areas amounted to about 40 million dollars. We agree with the GM that it is outrageous that ZETDC be expected to continue to supply electricity when however we stress that where there are reasonable unresolved disputes over estimates etc there must be substantial negotiation.

Demand Side Management:

Members are encouraged to take all measures necessary to conserve electricity (when it is supplied of course). The use of energy saving bulbs is encouraged and management of large appliances such as heaters, pool pumps and geysers.

Electricity Safety:

We will be liaising with ZETDC to provide safety briefings in the future. Please ensure any electrical wiring is done according to the minimum safety standards. In the event of a fault or downed cables please make a report as soon as possible.

Theft and Vandalisation:

This is an enormous problem. Reports of this to ZETDC should be made as promptly as possible. ZETDC is encouraging that farmers place guards on transformers and where possible set up neighbourhood watch schemes to protect electricity lines.

LABOUR UPDATE - (from the desk of Marc Carrie-Wilson)

We have no doubt that many of our members are experiencing pressure from the NEC to remit dues to them. This article is intended to update members on this issue.

To recap SI 101 of 2010 published in June 2010 sets out a purported Collective Bargaining Agreement ("CBA") which was concluded in February 2009. It sets the dues payable to NEC as 1 USD deducted from each employee matched by a further 1 USD paid by the employer for each employee.

In terms of the Labour Act a CBA becomes binding when it is registered and published as a SI by the Registrar of Labour, so in this case this was in June 2010. The Act further provides that it is a criminal offence to not abide by the terms of a legally binding CBA.

However, acting on direction from the ALB we have advised all members to keep these dues aside until the conclusion of a legal challenge instituted in the Labour Court. The reasons for this are that there are allegations which have come to our attention of very gross breaches of the financial and other provisions of the NEC Constitution by the NEC and its secretariat as follows:

• The NEC has not produced an audited set of accounts for the past five years. (This is in violation of Article 24(2) of its Constitution).

• The NEC has regularly not had an annual budget ratified by the full Council, or if so, not all the Councillors were invited to attend the meeting where such ratification took place, nor have they had sight of such budget. (This is in violation of Article 22(2) of the NEC Constitution).

• The NEC has not recorded proper and accurate minutes of all the meetings of the council or the Collective Bargaining Processes. (Contravening Article 19 of the NEC Constitution).

• No proper notice of meetings of the NEC is sent to all NEC Councillors. (See Article 16 (4) of the NEC Constitution).

• CBAs concluded at subcommittee level are not ratified by the full Council of the NEC before being forwarded to the Ministry of Labour for Registration. (See Article 13(1) of the NEC Constitution).

• NEC Councillors are being paid extravagant meeting allowances of approximately USD 200 for every meeting they attend. This is more than the salary of many Civil Servants.

It has also been reported that requests to view the audited accounts have not been entertained. Thus we can only assume that there is substantial validity in these allegations. How can any reasonable person continue to remit funds to the NEC when its fundamental structures of governance and financial accountability have seemingly collapsed? Instead we advise that these dues be held aside by members until these issues are settled by the Labour Court. If on the other hand the NEC is able to show you the authentic and duly audited accounts for the past 5 years, which accord with proper budgets made in terms of the NEC Constitution, then you are encouraged to remit your dues to the NEC without delay.

The NEC's only remedy which it will pursue is to make a complaint of a criminal offence against members who to the ZRP in order to institute Criminal Proceedings. However this matter is already before the Labour Court and it would be advisable for the Labour Court (which has the status of the High Court) to make its determination on this matter before a Magistrates Court consider the criminal case. We would ask any member presented with this challenge to contact our offices (Tongai or Marc) for advice on this point.

Rumours of NEC personal seizing the property of certain members are extremely alarming if these are true. To be clear, no one has a right to seize property in recovery of an alleged debt unless they have obtained an order from a court in their favour and the seizure is presided over by a court official. Such activity should be reported to the Police.

Other developments are that the CBA setting the General Agricultural Wage at USD44 per month, back dated to September 2009, has finally been Gazetted as a Statutory Instrument in the form of SI 25 of 2011. Once again our representative body in these negotiations has informed us that they were not party to this Agreement notwithstanding the fact that they are named as a party in the Agreement. They have informed us that they will be exploring the possibility of a legal challenge against this and we will keep you informed accordingly. The publication of this Agreement as a Statutory Instrument is confusing because of the presumption against the retroactive application of legislation. Therefore it is submitted that the SI does not oblige employers to make back payments. It is absurd to think that any legitimate employer would willingly agree to pay 7 months or more back pay in the current multi currency economy. This seriously undermines the viability of business.

IT is hereby notified that the Collective Bargaining Agreement set out in the Schedule, which amends the agreement published in Statutory Instrument 323 of 1993, has been registered in terms of section 79 of the Labour Relations Act [*Chapter 28:01*].

COLLECTIVE BARGAINING AGREEMENT: AGRICULTURAL INDUSTRY (WAGES FOR THE TIMBER SECTOR EFFECTIVE 1 SEPTEMBER 2009 TO 30 SEPTEMBER 2010)

Made and entered in accordance with the provisions of the Labour Relations Act [*Chapter 28:01*], between the Zimbabwe Agricultural Employers Organisation, Zimbabwe Commercial Farmers' Union, Zimbabwe Farmers' Union as the one part, and the General Agricultural and Plantation Worker's Union of Zimbabwe (hereinafter referred to as "the employees" or "trade union") and Horticultural General Agricultural Plantation Workers' Union of Zimbabwe as the other part, being parties to the National Employment Council for the Agricultural Industry to amend the principal agreement Statutory Instrument 323 of 1993.

Wages/salary increases

NOW, THEREFORE, it is recorded that the awarded new minimum wages for the Timber Sector in the Agricultural Industry of Zimbabwe as provided for in Statutory Instrument 323 of 1993 shall be as follows:

There is probably only between 25,000 and 40,000 tonne's of beans that have been produced this year. This will not go far before the traders will need to import again thus driving prices higher.

I did ask last week if any farmers would be interested in growing wheat this winter to contact me as there is a finance package available. CFU are in negotiations with ZESA to try extract a guarantee that there will be uninterrupted power to wheat producers. We will keep you updated. Still needing ZINWA to reduce their water charges to a realist charge (\$2/mega Itr would be good)



We have been fairly busy of late and at the same time there has not been a lot to report on the ARAC side. There are a number of issues that will nonetheless be of interest to you.

- 1. The Union council restructuring has got underway and significantly there is now a specific compensation sub-committee of council headed by VP Charles Taffs. This committee has both regional representation and includes ARAC committee members. People with particular expertise will be called in as necessary and this will include regular close contact with VALCON.
- It has come to our notice that there are significant numbers of farmers who have shareholdings in farming related companies and whilst the interests might be small in many instances companies don't have current contact details. If you are one of these and you would like us to follow up please give us your details.
- 3. We recognise that for those people who are still farming in very difficult circumstances our emphasis on compensation may seem to undermine their day to day issues. We are focused on a solution that will bring a future to all farmers and not exclusively on compensation.
