2. <u>OBITUARY</u>

Last week we lost another of the great characters of our industry who had made such a huge personal contribution to agriculture in Zimbabwe and we publish below a very fitting obituary written by an old friend of us all, past President Jim Sinclair. Although he will be missed he most certainly will not be forgotten.

"Ben Norton 1929-2011

Ben Norton was born in Aliwal North Eastern Cape and died peacefully in his home in Amber Valley, Howick Natal on the 27th of October 2011.

He spent his last few years in Somerset West, Cape and Howick, Natal.

He was a remarkable man, conservationist, hunter and fisherman, leading and innovative farmer, raconteur and loving husband, father and grandfather. Those of us who knew him well knew him to be a man of action and also ideas. He pushed his strongly held views on a large variety of subjects with determination and sometimes downright cussedness.

His farm Dahywe became a showpiece with his leadership in the use of legumes in pastures and his well stocked game park. He was also a top cattleman with his herd of Brahmins. He was active in organised agriculture being the Chairman of the Cattle Producers Association and a member of C.F.U. Council, also taking a prominent role in the Mashonaland Hunters Association with an interest in conservation education.

Those of us lucky enough to know him well had wonderful trips to the Zambezi with Jenny and him and his property at Chirundu was a Mecca for starting fishing and canoeing trips.

Jenny and Ben's son Larry the well known wildlife artist in a commentary on his work titled "In the Valley of Memories" a wonderful painting of Mana says the following.

"The three buffalo painted in the front of the herd reminded me of my Dad, Ben Norton and his two good friends, John Wood and Bill Francis. The three of them hunted together, fished together, argued furiously across campfires and walked untold miles through dry jesse bush. They gave us kid's incredible memories, experiences, bellowing reprimands and endless humour".

All three of those great characters are sadly now no longer with us and this really is the end of an era.

In common with many of us he suffered hugely from the wanton destruction wreaked upon his property in the guise of so-called land reform.

I am personally grateful that Ann and I had the privilege of knowing Ben Norton. He was the kind of person who added a great deal to our lives. We shall miss him but we know he is in a better place. He is survived by his wife Jenny and his son Larry and his family.

3. <u>SECURITY</u>

This week we have had another fairly quiet week as far as reported disruptions on farms, which have been taken advantage of by those who are still farming who have been able to complete the harvesting of their wheat crops and get busy with the planting of their summer crops. They have no doubt welcomed the early rain on such new crops and we can only hope that it continues.

However there has been one reported case of a farmer being evicted by his DA but we believe that he is now back on the farm. In Bulawayo an entire family were severely assaulted during a robbery of the farm wages last Sunday evening. Although the police have reacted there is no news of any arrests yet. As we have previously warned farmers, whether on their farms or living in town, they should tighten up their security in their homes as there have been a number of attempted and successful robberies in Bulawayo and other centres during this time of economic hardships and high unemployment. Don't put you and your families at risk by carrying large sums of money.

There have still been no arrests in the majority of the recent assaults and murders, apart from the incident in which Keith Nicholson lost his life where 6 arrests have been made. This has of course led to a lot of speculation and even more reason to be extremely careful.

A guest speaker at the Open Farmers' Meeting next week will be Mr Alfred Nkhono who is the **General Manager of Press Agriculture Limited (PAL) in Malawi** who are offering long term subleases for some 112 properties in Malawi. He and his associates will be on hand to answer any questions you may have if you are interested.

The **diesel shortage** being experienced in Harare appears to have been resolved, or at least subsided as the product is now being freely advertised at locations where stocks were either previously absent or in limited supply only to their own regular customers.

5. <u>STATUTORY INSTRUMENTS</u>

In the **Government Gazette** this week there were several Statutory Instruments which concerned our members, all three of which have been uploaded onto the website <u>www.cfuzim.org</u> under the section, **The law, Acts and Statutory Instruments**.

11. LIVESTOCK REPORT 04/11/2011 (From the desk of Rob van Vuuren)

<u>NADF</u>

The next NADF Executive meeting is scheduled for the 15^{th} November 2011 at Agriculture House Marlborough commencing at 08.00 am.

The NADF Small-Scale Farmer's field day is scheduled to take place on the 9th November, 2011 on Mr Hela's farm which is in close proximity to the Marirangwe Milk Collection, Harare South.

Dr. Rachel Stewart has kindly prepared the following programme for our members.

Recommended Vaccination and Prevention Program for Zimbabwean Dairy Herds.

- DRY COWS
- At drying off (which should be done when 7 months pregnant)
- 1. Rotavirus, coronavirus, E. coli, Clostridium perfringens type C (**scour** guard/ bovishield)
- Clostridium chauveoi (Blackleg), Clostridium septicum (malignant oedema), Clostridium novyi (Black disease), Clostridium sordelli, Clostridium perfringens type C and D (pulpy kidney), Pasteurella (Mannheim) haemolytica (Haemorrhagic septicaemia). All of these come as one vaccine from Pfizer called **Ultra shot 7.**
- 3. If this is the first time cows are vaccinated against Clostridium it should be followed by a booster vaccination of just the clostridial diseases four weeks later. This vaccine is also available from Pfizer and is called **Ultra Choice.**
- 4. Salmonella typhimurium, Salmonella Dublin, Salmonella Newport (Cattle (calf) paratyphoid). This is what the South Africans called **bovillus s**
- 5. Use an appropriate dry cow therapy that contains either penicillin, streptomycin, ampicillin or cloxacillin or all the above. If not sure of appropriateness of antibiotic in the therapy please consult with me.
- 6. Teat dip all dry cows daily for a week after dry off.
- 7. Treat all dry cows with an injection of Vitamin A, D and E and selenium three weeks before calving.
- 8. Teat dip all cows again daily for two weeks before calving

PREGNANT HEIFERS when they are 7 months pregnant

- 1. scourguard
- 2. ultra shot 7
- 3. bovillus s
- 4. all of the above three should be **repeated** at three weeks before calving (only in pregnant heifers)
- 5. If there is a problem with mastitis in the heifers then you can inject them with pen strep or infuse with an appropriate lactating cow therapy three weeks before calving. (I prefer the injection as infusing can open the teat canal and cause problems)
- 6. Inject heifers with Vitamin A, D, E and selenium three weeks before calving.
- 7. Teat dip all heifers daily for two weeks before calving

FRESH COWS 30 days after calving but before re breeding 1. Campylobacter fetus (vibrio), Leptospira spp, Infectious bovine rhinotracheitis, Infectious pustular vulvovaginitis, Parainfluenza 3, Bovine virus diarrhea. Used to be called **preg guard 9 also called** vibrio lepto or bovishield. ADULT HERD yearly vaccinations 1. Clostridium tetani (tetanus), Clostridium botulinum (Botulism), Bacillus anthracis (Anthrax). Do this a month before you expect the rains (October) 2. Lumpy skin disease also one month before rains 3. Ephemeral fever (3 day stiff sickness) at the onset of the rains (November) 4. Rift Valley Fever one month before rains CALVES 1. 5 days of age Calf paratyphoid (Salmonella vaccine) 2. 4 weeks of age ultra shot 7, bovishield and bovillus 3. 5 months old ultra shot 7, bovishield, bovillus, contagious abortion. 4. 12 months old Tetanus, botulism, anthrax DEWORMING 1. weaning to 6 months of age dose against tapeworm and roundworm once a month (need a remedy with Albendazole and praziquantel in it) 6 months to one month before first calf dose once a month 2. against roundworm and liver fluke (Albendazole and tramizol) at dry off in adult cows dose against round worm and liver 3. fluke)

BULLS

- 1. Supavax, lumpy skin disease, ephemeral fever, foot and mouth, bovishield once a year before the rains as with the cows
- 2. RB51 at 6 months of age, a year of age and then every second year.
- 3. Vitamin A, D, E and selenium once a year.
- 4. Dose for liver fluke before and after the rains.
- 5. Dose for round worms at least twice a year but more if required.
