# **KASEMPA FARMERS PROTEST OVER FISP**

With the FISP e-voucher K400 deposits having officially closed third week of January 2018, some farmers in Kasempa District have expressed dissatisfaction with the program claiming they made the prerequisite payments but their cards have not been activated.

Over 200 Farmers in Kasempa district stormed the office of the District Commissioner (DC) demanding for their farming inputs under the Farmer Input Support Programme (FISP) e-voucher program. The farmers expected or redeem inputs by December 2017.

The farmers deposited their money with Pay Code before or on 13th December 2017. The farmers, however say their money has not reflected in the system and have not been able to collect their inputs from the agro dealers.

The DC called for calm among farmers as the matter was being investigated.

## KALOMO FARMERS BOSH FISP

Some farmers from Kalomo district are shocked that for three seasons, the FISP has failed to capture them and have their cards activated in spite of meeting all requirements demanded by the program.

The farmers who stormed the office of the Ministry of Agriculture Permanent Secretary Julius Shawa this week say their e voucher cards have not been credited for the 2015/2016, 2016/2017 and the current 2017/2018 farming seasons, despite having successfully deposited the required monies.

Mr. Shawa has assured the farmers that their complaints and proposals would be forwarded to the Minister of Agriculture Dora Siliya for further action.

The farmers have been expecting feedback from the Ministry of Agriculture by today Friday 2<sup>nd</sup> February 2018.

## LAKE KARIBA DOWN 0.02 METRES

Water levels in Lake Kariba have continued to drop, receding to 480.47 metres on 29<sup>th</sup> January 2018 from 480.49 metres at the close of last week.

This represents a 0.02 metres decline. Last year on the same date, the Lake level was 478.65 metres.

The Kariba Lake was created and designed to operate between levels 475.50m and 488.50m with 0.70m freeboard at all times.










#### KARIBA RESERVOIR Comparison of Daily Reservoir Levels

# COOPERATIVE LEADERS SWINDLING FARMERS INPUTS UNDER FISP IN LUNDAZI

With about 80% reached under FISP e-voucher redemption in Lundazi, there has been an outcry from most cooperative members that they have allegedly been swindled of their farming inputs by their cooperatives leaders.

Out of a FISP e-voucher card whose value is K2, ooo, farmers have only been receiving two bags of fertilizers from their leaders. The leaders have allegedly also held onto their FISP e-voucher cards.

This came to light when the ZNFU Lundazi office visited the District Agricultural Coordinators (DACO)'s office which was crowded by farmers demanding an explanation. And when reached for comment Mr. Philemon Lungu, the DACO for Lundazi, blamed the whole occurrence on the agro dealers and the farmers themselves. He said his office has the ducate farmers on the policy guidelines for e-voucher. He also said some agro





dealers were playing a part by giving commissions to the co-operative leaders per card redeemed.

Meanwhile, out of the 27,070 registered farmers under FISP e-voucher 2018, only 23,989 managed to meet the K400 obligation and according the DACO's office only 18,210 cards have been redeemed so far. Some of the challenges experience are; agro dealers bypassing the ZIAMIS system, missing cards and withholding of cards.

## STOCK BORERS ARE DESTROYING CROPS

Stock borers have invaded Serenje District destroying crop, resulting in some farmers panicking. ZNFU visited some farms around Serenje and found that more than 10 hectares of maize fields had been destroyed by the worms. And the worms are spreading fast.

A farmer, Mr. Ernest Chilambe Ernest, said his 5 hectares of maize field has been destroyed by the stock borers. The ZNFU encouraged farmers to be vigilant and spray their fields and control the manifestation of the worms.

And farmers in Serenje have complained of late activation of their VISA cards and late payment for the crop supplied to the Food Reserve Agency (FRA). Farmers are also worried with the prolonged dry spell.

of farming in this country and reduce the likelihood of more and more farms being foreclosed at a time when Government is targeting the agriculture sector to be the main spinner of inclusive economic growth. ## **BAMBOO SEEDLINGS ON SALE**

Bamboo is an alternative to traditional timber. It's a renewable resource, it matures in 3-4 years and has 1500 recorded uses and benefits.

Competition for timber is getting tougher, trees resources are becoming scarce and opportunities to plant are more limited. Farmers can use bamboo for erosion control and regeneration of land. Free falling bamboo leaves can be used to obtain humus of between 2025 tons per acre.





Bamboo is an excellent substitute for making of briquettes and charcoal and thus reducing deforestation by making use of idle land. Bamboo seedlings are available for sale.
