ZAMBIA ON RED ALERT; AS LISTERIOSIS STAGGERS SOUTH AFRICA

The Zambian government has upped disease surveillance following the outbreak of listeriosis in South Africa, a major import source of food products by the country.



Government has directed the disease surveillance team and health inspectors to diligently investigate all suspicious food products and take appropriate action including destruction of contaminated or suspicious products.

This is in line with the Public Health Act CAP 295, the Food and Drugs Act CAP 303 and the SI no. 79 of 2017 of The Laws of Zambia.

According to a statement made available to the Zambia National Farmers' Union (ZNFU), Minister of Health Dr. Chitalu Zambia has not recorded any case of Listeriosis. He said the Ministry is working with local and international stakeholders to ensure that people are protected from this outbreak.

He called on the general public to take extra caution regarding eating risky foods which include processed, ready-to-eat meat products, soft cheeses, and unpasteurized milk and dairy products to prevent this disease.

And the Ministry of Health has put in place a number of interventions in the wake of the Listeriosis outbreak. These include:

- 1. A team of experts led and coordinated by the Zambia National Public Health Institute has since been constituted to urgently address the concerns of the country because Zambia imports a lot of food products listed as risky from South Africa.
- 2. An immediate ban on imports of risky foods including processed meats, dairy products, vegetables and fruits from South Africa.
- 3. The Points of Entry (boarder) have been instructed to seize all suspected risky products.
- 4. All CEO's of major chain stores have been engaged and directed to cooperate with Health Inspectors in the removal and disposal of the risk products from their shelves and stores.
- 5. Active food safety surveillance has been enforced across the Country.
- 6. Nationwide Active Public Health Disease Surveillance.
- 7. Laboratory Investigations will be carried out at the University Teaching Hospital Microbiology Laboratory and The University of Zambia School of Veterinary Medicine.
- 8. The National Codex Alimentarius Committee will conduct a scientific risk assessment on cold meats to ascertain the risk in the country
- 9. Risk communication to the public through various media platforms on preventative measures which include avoiding eating risky foods including processed, ready-to-eat meat products, soft cheese, and unpasteurized milk and dairy products.

According to the Ministry of Health, Listeriosis is caused by bacteria *called Listeria* **monocytogenes**. In mild cases, symptoms include fever and sometimes nausea or diarrhoea. While in severe cases, the bacteria may spread to the blood stream and





nervous system with symptoms such as headache, stiff neck, confusion, loss of balance and convulsions. It may also be fatal.

The risk groups include; pregnant women, new-borns, the elderly (over 65 years of age) and immuno-compromised adults. Infected pregnant women may experience a mild, flulike illness and in more serious cases, it may cause miscarriages, stillbirths, premature delivery, or life-threatening infection to the new-born.

The common sources of infection include dairy products, meats from infected animals, fruits and vegetables.

SADC COUNTRIES BAN PROCESSED MEATS AND DAIRY IMPORTS FROM SOUTH AFRICA

Six southern African countries have banned the importation of processed meats and dairy products from South Africa.

This follows an outbreak of Listeriosis in South Africa, which has claimed 180 lives thus far. The Listeriosis outbreak has claimed more than 180 lives in the southern African country. Over 900 people in South Africa have officially been reportedly affected.

The World Health Organisation (WHO) has described the Listeriosis outbreak in the southern African country as the most fatal and largest occurrence ever in the world, prompting Zambia and other Southern African Development Community (SADC) countries to apply breaks on processed foods imports from that country as a precautionary measure.

The Ministry of Health has since directed all South African chain stores operating in Zambia to

remove all such line of products from their shelves. The cooperation has been instant.

The Listeriosis outbreak has been traced to the Enterprise Foods meat processing plant in the Limpopo province, South Africa, and that government has banned the affected products of two leading food processing companies following confirmation

that some processed meat products are contaminated with Listeria bacterium.

Other SADC countries that have banned the importation of processed food meats and dairy products from South Africa include Botswana, Mozambique, Namibia, Malawi and Zimbabwe.

LAKE KARIBA LEVELS CONTINUE RISING

The Lake level rose by 0.56m during the week under review due to localised rainfall activities that are being recorded around the lake coupled with the main stream Zambezi River inflows and closed the week at 481.97m on 2nd March 2018. Last year on the same date, the Lake level

was 480.06m.


This is according to the latest report by the Zambezi River Authority (ZRA). Below is the water level graph.


Maize Updates

- High maize prices in Kenya have attracted a lot of maize from its neighbouring countries with Uganda's maize exports to Kenya more than doubling between December 2017 and January 2018 according to data from the East African grain Council (EAGC). Maize wholesale prices were recorded at US\$298.62 in some Kenyan markets whilst Ugandan prices were hovering around US\$193/ton.
- Zimbabwe's Grain Marketing Board (GMB) is expected to split into two separate entities by 1st April 2018. One entity will be dealing with strategic reserves whilst the other will be a full-fledged commercial entity that will be milling and selling small grains.
- On the local scene, there seems to be ample maize supply with about 32,000MT of maize being offered for sale on the Zambia Commodity Exchange (ZAMACE) platform and no bidders for the commodity. The sale offer prices of maize were in the range of US\$170-200 (≈K1,700 -2,000/MT) as at 7th March 2018.

International Price Trends

International Maize prices have maintained their upward trajectory in the early part of **Werely-With the** U.S gulf spot prices of yellow maize pegged at US\$174.25/MT on 6th March 2018 while the white maize futures for May delivery on Safex settled at ZAR

Soya beans updates


- India has raised its import duty on crude palm oil to 44% from 30% Refined Bleached Deodorized palm (RBD) to 55% from 40%. This is in an effort of protecting the local farmers and processors of edible oils. India is the largest importer of palm oil and this hike in tariff will result in Malaysia and Indonesia increasing their exploration and exploitation of cheaper markets.
- Locally, only one bid to purchase soya beans was recorded on ZAMACE this week at a price of US\$ 425/MT (≈US\$4250/ton).

 The skyrocketing of international soya beans prices on the back drop of the Argentinian drought is being kept in check by anticipated increases in the soya beans output from Brazil and USA. While the Soya beans futures price on Safex seems to have dipped a little this week, the US Gulf prices have maintained an upward thrust and were quoted at US\$410.42/TM on Tuesday 6th March 2018


Wheat Updates

- South Africa's wheat exports into the region declined from 6,501MT in January 2018 to 5,331MT in February 2018. SAGIS data further indicates that the country's imports over the same period increased from 135,474MT to 311,807MT. Argentina was the major source of South Africa's imports during in the first two months of 2018.
- On the local scene, the lake Kariba water levels edged up to 481.97m during the week ending 2nd March 2018. This is higher than the levels of 480m achieved last year according to the Zambezi River Authority. The Lake is designed to operate between 475.50m and 488.50m.
- Local wheat offer prices are around K4300/ton (≈US\$430/ton)

International Price Trends

The South African bread milling wheat for July delivery averaged ZAR3720MT (\approx US\$316.6/ton) on 6th March 2018. The US gulf fob spot prices of soft red wheat where on the other hand hovering around US\$210/ton on the same day.

PDFA TO IMPLEMENT VILLAGE CHICKEN PASS ON PROJECT

Petauke District Farmers Association plans to implement a village chicken pass on project as one of its strategies of boosting membership mobilization.

This came to light during the quarterly board meeting that was held on the 6th of March 2018 were all the board members welcomed the project idea.

The project will be implemented alongside the SAPP funded project of 'Village Chicken Breed Improvement Project' which the DFA is currently implementing in the district. The project will be empowering information centres with 30 chicks that will reach a membership of 20 members. The DFA targets to recruit a total of 2,000 members out of





the implementation of the project and many more from other services such as the Lima Credit Scheme (LCS).
