## IRRITECH TO HOLD IRRIGATION DEMONSTRATIONS

Irritech Zambia is on 15<sup>th</sup> and 16<sup>th</sup> June 2018 hosting an open day to showcase a wide array of irrigation systems.

The event is expected to attract farmers across all strata; small scale, emergent and large scale.

The open day will also bring together, apart from experts from Irritech; other farm input suppliers, farming experts from South Africa, Botswana and Zambia.

This for a is expected to be used for interaction, exchange of ideas, networking with peers, suppliers and agricultural stakeholders and sealing of transactions in a relaxed and friendly atmosphere.

Mr. Franek Rociborski, the Founder and Chairman of Irritech will travel from South Africa to grace the occasion.

# AGRICULTURE, PANACEA TO POVERTY REDUCTION; ECL

President Edgar Chagwa Lungu says the agriculture sector continues to offer the greatest potential for economic growth and lifting of thousands of Zambians out of poverty.

Reiterating Government's resolve of making agriculture the mainstay of the economy, the President said government will continue implementing viable programmes to grow the agriculture sector. He said the sector offers vast opportunities to improve the





wellbeing of the majority of Zambians; especially in the rural communities. He was speaking during the official opening of the 2018 Copperbelt Agriculture, Mining, Industrial, Networking and Enterprises Expo (CAMINEX) in Kitwe in Thursday 7<sup>th</sup> June 2018.

### **ZNFU COUNCIL EXHIBITS UNITY OF PURPOSE**

The 2018 Council Meeting was held on 31<sup>st</sup> May 2018 to discuss the affairs of the Union as Council is the highest policy organ of the Union. During the deliberations, candid views were aired and there was full recognition that despite the turbulent times which the Union had gone through, the leadership and management at the helm were doing a good job at addressing the core activities of the Union and resolving the legacy challenges.

During the meeting, the President encouraged members to grow the local level presence of the Union by revisiting the original ideas that led to the formation of the DFAs. The meeting noted that some DFAs have successfully mobilized resources to construct DFA offices or storage shed and even engaging in business ventures, which demonstrates that there are many opportunities that can be exploited. The President emphasized that the DFAs doing well should be emulated by those not doing so well through sharing of ideas.

DFAs were urged to work hard on the loan schemes that will be introduced after the Lima audit is concluded and requested to provide the Lima auditors with all the information they need so that the audit can be concluded as soon as possible.

The audited accounts were presented and adopted. The meeting noted that the union is currently using self-generated funds and so it is important for everyone to pay subscription fees upfront at the beginning of the year to keep the union operational. Council members pledged to double efforts in mobilizing subscriptions and contribute to improving the income base of the Union by midyear.

### LAKE KARIBA NOTCHES UP TO 82% FULL

Lake Kariba water levels rose to 486.38m on  $4^{th}$  June 2018 from 486.14 metres recorded last week to close at 82 per cent full.

According to the Zambezi River Authority (ZRA), the Lake level rose by 0.23m during the week under review due to inflows on the main stream Zambezi River.


Last year on the same date, the Lake level was 483.08m or 55 per cent full.

# **INDUSTRY UPDATES**

## YEAR ON YEAR INFLATION RATE INCREASES

The Central Statistical Office (CSO) in their monthly bulletin reported that the year on year rate of inflation for May 2018 increased to 7.8 percent from 7.4 percent in April 2018. This basically means that prices of goods and services, on average, increased by 7.8 percent between May 2017 and May 2018. Price movements in food and transport, specifically breakfast mealie meal, rice imported, bread and motor vehicles are the main contributors to the annual increase in the rate of inflation. Eastern province recorded the highest annual rate of inflation at 10.9 percent while Luapula province recorded the lowest at 4.7 percent.









The month on month rate of inflation for May 2018 was recorded at 0.4 percent relative to the 0.6 percent recorded in April 2018. This shows a 0.2 percent decrease. This means that prices of goods and services between April 2018 and May 2018 increased by 0.4 percent.

## COMMODITY UPDATES

## **Maize Updates**

- RATIN reports that Kenya has not allowed the growing or importation of Genetically Modified Organism (GMO) foods rather they are working on developing new maize varieties that can mature within 105 and 110 days instead of the normal 120 days.
- Maize goes to waste in the North Rift region of Kenya due to lack of market and proper storage facilities after government stopped buying the crop. The Kenyan National Cereals and Produce Board (NCPB) exceeded the target after cartels imported cheap maize and sold it to the NCBP to the detriment of the local farmers. (Source: RATIN 2018)
- According to RATIN, Maize prices for a 90 Kg bag during the week ending 8<sup>th</sup> June 2018 ranged from US\$ 28.48 28.56 for Kenya, US\$ 23.59 23.69 for Tanzania and US\$ 38.33 43.44 for Burundi. These prices were applicable in the capital cities of these countries.


• The U.S gulf spot prices of yellow maize was quoted at US\$ 170.72/MT on 7<sup>th</sup> June 2018 while the white maize futures for June delivery on SAFEX settled at ZAR 2078/MT (≈US\$162.98/MT).

## **Soya Beans Updates**

- ZAMACE during the week ending 8<sup>th</sup> June 2018 recorded six (6) bids for Grade A Soya Beans at a minimum and maximum price of ZMK 3,810/tonne and ZMK 4,500/tonne respectively.
- Argentina has resorted to import soya beans from the US for the first time in more than two decades. The countries soya bean crushing industry has a 67 million tonnes crush capacity annually but with the industry needing more of the oil seed, Argentina is looking to other countries including the US to meet its demand. (Source: World Grain, 2018)
- RATIN reports that Soya beans prices for a 90 Kg bag during the week ending 8<sup>th</sup> June 2018 ranged from US\$ 53.4 53.56 for Kenya, US\$ 78.61 78.97 for Tanzania and US\$ 81.69 86.87 for Burundi. These prices were for soya beans in the countries capitals.










### **International Price Trends**

• The U.S gulf spot price of Soya beans was pegged at US\$ 385.73/MT on 7<sup>th</sup> June 2018 while the Soya beans futures for June delivery on SAFEX settled at ZAR 4470/MT (≈US\$350.59/MT).

## Wheat Updates

- SAGIS CEC during the week ending 1st June 2018, reported that South Africa (SA) did not export any wheat to Zambia. The South African wheat exports to Zambia have been declining in the last few weeks, this could probably be due to the wheat planting exercise which usually takes place in May every year.
- Wheat prices for a 90 Kg bag during the week ending 8<sup>th</sup> June 2018 ranged from US\$ 57.85 58.02 for Kenya, US\$ 51.1 51.33 for Tanzania and US\$ 73.81 76.65 for Burundi. These prices are reflecting the capital cities price situation. (Source: RATIN 2018)


### **International Price Trends**
