KATAMBO CALLS FOR POOLED REGIONAL EFFORTS TO FIGHT FALL ARMY WORMS

Agriculture minister, Michael Katambo is concerned that the Fall Army Worms (FAW) have continued to ravage farmer production, with the worst hit being the small scale farmers.

And African Development Bank (AfDB) Zambia Manager Mary Monyau says 12 countries have been affected by the FAW within the last 12 years.

Speaking during a high level regional partnership meeting on controlling FAWs in the southern African region, Mr. Katambo mused on how small scale farmers have been adversely affected by the pest leading to productivity and food security being compromised.

He called for regional stakeholder collaboration to control the spread of the FAWs, saying this is so because the pest is trans-boundary and highly mobile.

And Mr. Katambo has announced that the Zambian government has established a task team comprising government and other key stakeholders including research institutions to help in addressing the outbreaks of fall army worms in the country and the region at large.

The Minister called on scientists, scholars and governments in the region to investigate and moot ways in which to fight the FAW scare.

And Ms. Monyau says a lot needs to be done in combating FAWs. She said there is need to mobilizing resources for this cause and also apply scientific and management solutions beyond the use of synthetic materials.

She told the gathering that FAWs have propensity to cause between 21-53 percent maize yield losses. She said the FAW has during the last 12 years spread to 12 African countries causing losses estimated at between 2.4 billion and 6.2 billion United States dollars.

FRA REVISES MAIZE PRICE TO K70, IGNORES STAKEHOLDERS

The Food Reserve Agency (FRA) has revised the market price for maize from K65 to K70 per 50kg, the same as the price for August 2015, but without the due consultation process with stakeholders, including the Zambia National Farmers' Union (ZNFU).

The revision comes at the back of the directive by President Edgar Lungu who said the price was not fair on the producer and needed to be revisited to create a win-win situation in the value chain.

FRA board chairperson Joe Simachela announced this in a statement today, saying the increase has been necessitated by an outcry from various stakeholders: "The announcement of the price of Maize at K65 per 50kg bag specifically received mixed reactions from various stakeholders, which necessitated further consultations. The board and management of FRA have in consideration of the price band emanating from the analytical process of price determination employed by the agency decided to review the price of Maize upwards with consideration of the following factors: that price should be within the confines of the 2018 national budgetary allocation to FRA; should not pressure fund releases from the Treasury."

He said the FRA was being wary not to peg the price of maize too high as this would impact on the mealie meal price and the end user.

Meanwhile, ZNFU has maintained that farmers should target to sell their maize at a profit. The ZNFU has also urged farmers to bulk their maize and sell in consolidated volumes, which is bound to attract a better price as opposed to selling individually.

The Union says to realise this, ZAMACE would be the best platform for posting parcels of maize to sell. The Union has also advised farmers to consider making use of the warehouse receipts arrangements because warning that if all farmers try to sell maize at once, prices will drop even further.









KARIBA WATER LEVELS RECEDE


Water levels in Lake Kariba started to decline at closed at 486.82 metres on 23rd July 2018 after reaching a high of 486.90 metres during the season.

Last year on the same date, the Lake level was 483.00m.

The Lake levels are, however, still at 86% full. Last year during the same period, the lake levels stood at 55% full.

The Kariba Lake was created and designed to operate between levels 475.50m and 488.50m with 0.70m freeboard at all times.
