# **OVER 950, 000 ZAMBIANS ARE FOOD INSECURE**

A total of 954, 100 people are food insecure in Zambia and may need emergency food assistance, the highest figure after 2016.

In 2016, a total of 980, 000 people were food insecure.

According to the Integrated Phase Classification (IPC) Vulnerability Assessment Committee results of 2018, a UN publication, this is despite the country recording 2,394,900 tons of maize production in 2018, and in spite of having a carry-over stock of 844,200 tons.

This figure is over and above the 70, 000 people assessed to be precariously in need of food aid in 2017.

Some of the areas noted as needing emergency food include Western Province, some parts of Southern and Eastern Provinces, Lusaka and Luapula Provinces.

The areas captured are those that experienced prolonged dry spells, floods and pests; which impacted massively on agricultural production.

At national level, these are the major factors that led to a drop in national food production figures from 3,606,549 tons the previous season - a 33.6% per cent drop, or 20per cent below the five-year average.

# ... AS KATAMBO ASSURES OF FOOD SECURITY WITH RED FLAG RAISED

In spite of the Ministry of Agriculture instituting "restrictive measures" on export of maize by posting Zambia National Service (ZNS) soldier in strategic agricultural areas to avoid grain seepage, the Ministry says Zambians should not panic as the country has enough reserves.





With the 2018 FRA maize marketing window coming to a close on 31<sup>st</sup> October, Minister of Agriculture Michael Katambo says the country has stocked up to 420, 000 metric tonnes of grain, having bought 172, 000 metric tonnes to a tune of K241 million.

Honourable Katambo says the country is food secure as the reserve mopped up are sufficient, with a lot more still in the hands of farmers and traders.

Mr. Katambo told the 113<sup>th</sup> ZNFU Congress on October 19, that there is a restriction of maize exports. He, however, said this does not amount to a Statutory Instrument (SI) being passed, but a mere administrative measure to ensure the country is food secure.

## LAKE KARIBA RECEDES TO 68%

The Lake Kariba levels dropped by 0.19m on 22<sup>nd</sup> October 2018 to close the week at 484.68m. Last year on the same date, the Lake level was 481.58m. water levels at Lake Kariba now stand at 68 per cent full.

This is as a result of receding waters at the back of searing temperatures; which in some cases has reached as high as 37 Degrees Celsius and 38 Degrees Celsius, especially in valley areas.

The Kariba Lake was created and designed to operate between levels 475.50m and 488.50m with 0.70m freeboard at all times.

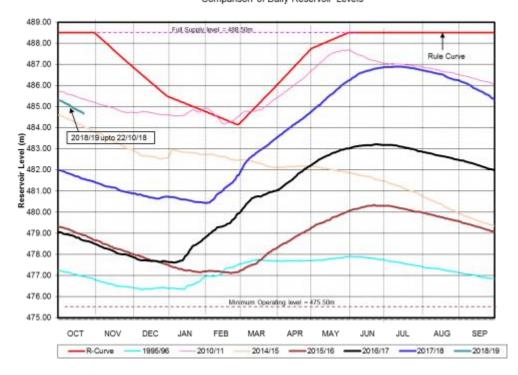

### ZAMBIA REMAINS STABLE

The Kwacha continued on a bearish streak in yesterday's trading session as corporate activity stayed low. Early morning quotes saw the local unit pegged in a wider band K11.7200/11.800 per dollar. anticipated, the kwacha got a knock from a globally stronger United States dollars exacerbated by a dwindle in supply flows. This saw the local unit close at K11.8500/11.900 per dollar, posting K1.5 depreciation on the day. # NAMIBIA'S BROILER INDUSTRY CONTRIBUTES 0.71% TO GDP

Despite the uncertainty around the current legislation, Namibia's broiler industry has performed exceptionally well, contributing 0.71% to Namibia's overall Gross Domestic Product. This is according to an economic impact assessment report commissioned by the local poultry association and conducted by Cirrus Capital. The firm stressed that while the 0.71% figure may seem insignificant, it is important to note that the Namibian economy has grown on average 4.05% a year since 1990.

Therefore, Cirrus Capital is of the view that the Namibian broiler industry has great potential for the country in terms of job creation, food security, and industrialisation, but it faces many challenges. Currently the industry has the benefit of import restrictions, a measure aimed at establishing a local





industry, however the South African Poultry Association has dragged the matter to court where it is currently bogged down. Membership of the Southern African Customs Union also makes dealing with anti-competitive behaviour and dumping very difficult.

"Uncertainty around the current legislation hampers the development of the industry, as new entrants fear their investment may be jeopardized," Cirrus Capital said in a statement this week. According to Cirrus, the industry could grow to 2% under the right conditions including clear, concise and supportive legislation and increased consumption of poultry products. Namibia lags far behind South Africa in annual per capita consumption of chicken, with roughly 13kg consumed locally compared to South Africa's 38kg. Local consumption stands at 2 500 tonnes per month, of which Namibia produces 1 900 (67%). Restrictions limit imports to a maximum of 1 500 tonnes per month, but the current protection sees importers trying to obtain the most quota instead of joining the local industry and moving from imports to local poultry purchases.

A survey conducted in the retail market shows that the shelf price of imported poultry products is only slightly lower than that of local products (or in some instances more expensive), thus the benefit of imported poultry does not pass through to the consumer. The domestic market has also ensured other types of poultry products, including fresh chicken, chicken livers, cleaned feet, etc., could enter the Namibian market. Many of these products are very cheap sources of protein for Namibian households.

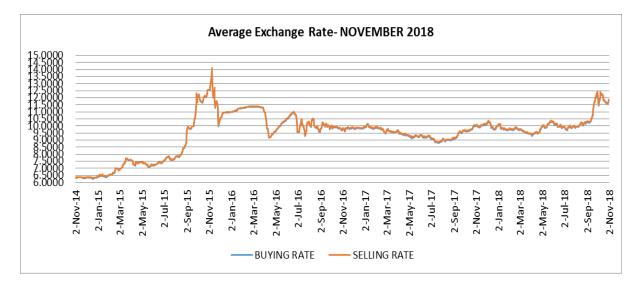
"Domestic demand for chicken meat is on the rise and the increase in demand is currently catered for by imports. However, local SMEs have started adding capacity too and Namibia could be selfsufficient by the end of 2019," Cirrus Capital added. Production input costs are higher in Namibia than South Africa, and Namib Poultry Industries (NPI) has streamlined its processes to be exceptionally efficient as the risk of water shortages in the long term has been reduced by the investment of N\$11 million in a reverse osmosis filtration system.

"NPI directly contributed N\$201 million to the Namibian economy in its 2017 financial year or 0.12% of the GDP. The local industry also contributed indirectly through its input purchases and employment, as well as by substituting local production for what would otherwise be imported. Taking these into account, the total contribution in 2017 amounts to N\$888 million or 0.71% of GDP. While this figure may seem insignificant, the Namibian economy has grown on average 4.05% a year since 1990. This means that NPI alone makes up around 18% of a single year's growth," Cirrus reported. The firm stressed that it is important that the industry is supported and developed further, adding that without a supportive legislative framework, it remains risky for new players to enter the market. "Government must catch up with private sector development in terms of the legislation it writes and the finalization of Namibia Board of Trade Bill," Cirrus Capital the urged. #### PRICES FOR THE DOCS REMAINED UNCHANGED



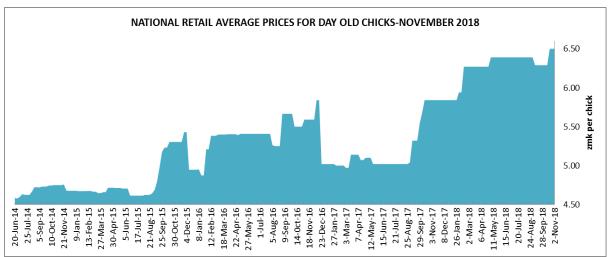
The average day old chick prices remained unchanged and still trading at ZMK6.5 from which is the same price as last week

#### LIVE BIRD PRICES REMAINS STABLE AMID IMPROVED SUPPLY

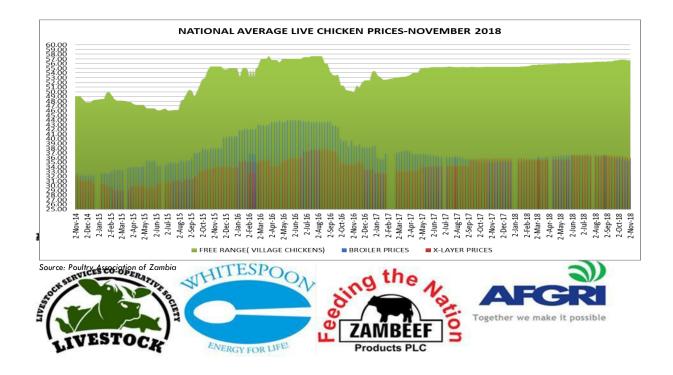


The national average prices for the broiler chickens remained stable during the course of the week. This is mainly attributed to oversupply of chicken in the market, low spending levels amongst the consumers among other factors.

The national live broiler bird prices are averaging ZMK35.50 from ZMK 35.3 recorded in the last two weeks

The X-layer prices also remained unchanged and still trading at ZMK 36.00 same price recorded last week.

The prices for the free range chickens averaged ZMK 56.77 from the ZMK 56.71 recorded in the same period.



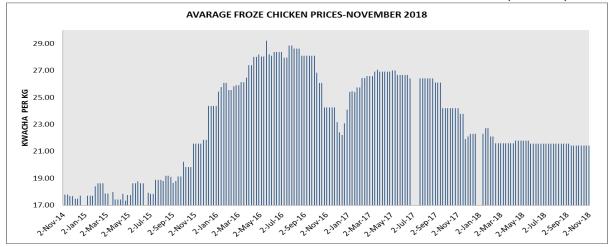


#### WHOLE DRESSED CHICKEN PRICES REMAINS UNCHANGED



There were no movements on prices of frozen chickens and pieces during the course of the week. The average price for the whole frozen chicken in Lusaka is still trading at about ZMK21.43 which is the same price that has been trending in the last three weeks. The lowest price in some chain stores is still trading at ZMK 18.99 per kg while the highest is on ZMK 27 per kg. The chicken sizes are ranging between 1.1kg to 1.6kg in different stores.

Please note that the prices are obtained from Pick n Pay, Shoprite, Zambeef, Melisa supermarket and Cheers Stores. Different outlets have different pricing models hence the figures displayed is an average price for all the sampled chainstores. It should also be noted that these are Lusaka prices only.

CHOLIMBA Farm in Mkushi has point of lay on sale and will ready in December 2018

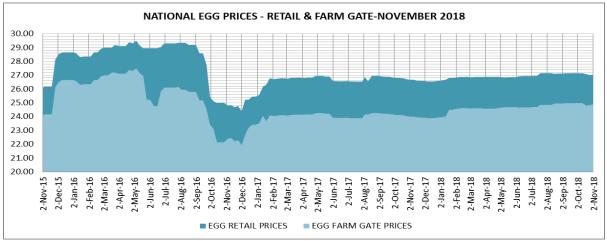
Base-Farm Pullet rearers also have birds available at competitive prices and ready for collection. A total of 16,000 birds available now.

#### NATIONAL RETAIL AVERAGE EGG PRICES REMAINS UNCHANGED



There was no significant price change in the egg subsector during the course of the week. The retail prices in markets that are operating within Lusaka averages between ZMK 24.83 to ZMK27.02 per tray for large eggs, and medium eggs while smaller eggs are trading between ZMK19.5 and ZMK22.7 farm gate price. No change on the prices of pullet eggs which are still trading between ZMK18 and ZMK19 per tray. Further, retail prices in some Chainstores have also remained unchanged, averaging between ZMK25 to ZMK36 per tray of 30 eggs depending on the supplier and packaging.

The national average prices for broiler and layer feed remained unchanged in the last two weeks. Broiler starter is still



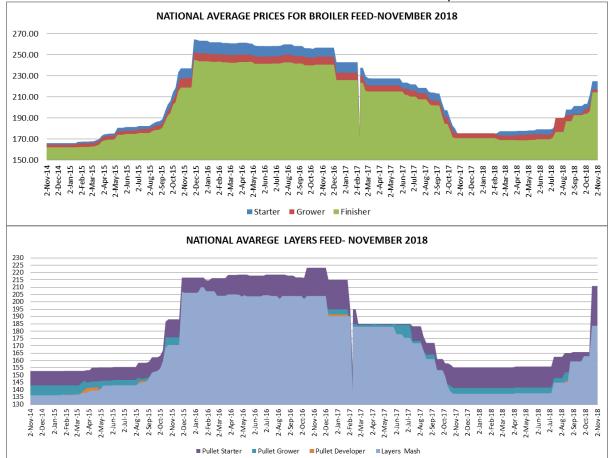

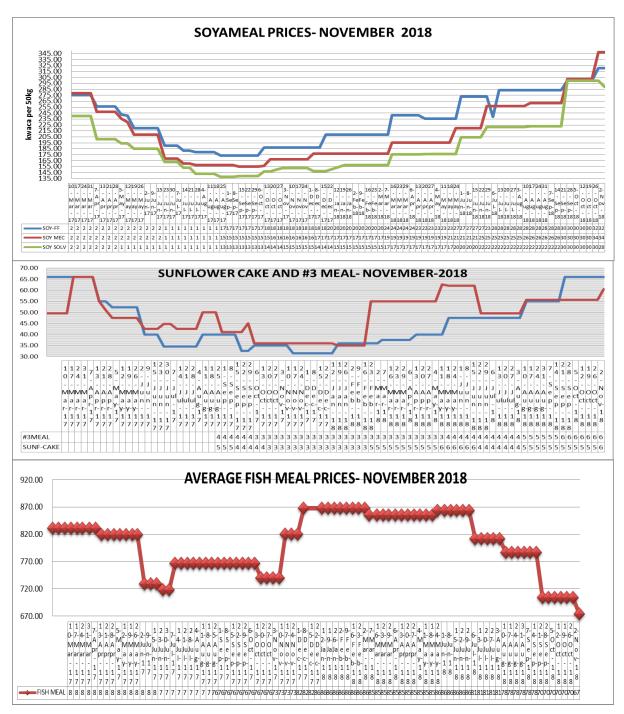
Finisher is averaging ZMK 214 compared with ZMK 193.07 recorded in the same period

In the same vain, the layer feed prices have been stable in the last two weeks. Layer feed is now trading at an average price of ZMK 210 for starter, ZMk 166.15 for pullet grower, ZMK 157.49 for pullet developer and finally ZMK 183.71 for layer mash.

# SEVEN DAYS WEATHER FORECAST 3<sup>RD</sup> NOVEMBER TO 9<sup>TH</sup> NOVEMBER 2018

## **GENERAL SITUATION**

During the period 3rd to 5th November, 2018, the weather will be characterized with relatively dry airflow from the south east affecting the Southern parts of Zambia and relatively moist and unstable airflow from the North-West (Congo air) affecting the Northern parts of Zambia. This will result into mainly sunny, windy and hot weather conditions to the South and occasional showers over the Northern parts.

However, from the 6th of November 2018, to the end of the forecast period; relatively dry and stable airflow from the south east will be affecting most parts of Zambia except for the extreme northern parts of the country that will be under the influence of unstable Congo airflow. This will give cloudy weather conditions with rainfall activities especially over the Western and extreme Northern parts of Zambia.

#### DETAILED FORECAST FROM 3RD TO 5TH NOVEMBER 2018

Lusaka and the western districts of Central province: Mainly sunny, windy at times and warm at first, becoming hot tending to be very hot in the valley areas and warm in the evening. The nights will be clear, windy at times and warm. The Rest of Zambia: Partly cloudy and warm at first becoming cloudy with a likelihood of showers in the afternoon especially over the Western, North-Western and Luapula provinces. #### DETAILED FORECAST FROM 6th TO 9th NOVEMBER 2018

Western, North-western, Copperbelt, Luapula and Northern Provinces: Partly cloudy and warm with a likelihood of morning rain, becoming cloudy and hot with showers and thunderstorms by afternoon. The nights will be partly cloudy and warm with rain in few places. The rest of Zambia: Mainly sunny and warm in the mornings, becoming partly cloudy and hot. The nights will be warm with few clouds.
