CARING FOR YOUR SHEEP IN THE WET WEATHER

Provide your sheep with a shelter this protects them from all the elements – sun, wind and RAIN. While a barn is great its not necessary. A three sided structure works just as well!.

A shaded area outside is also a good idea, it can be anything from an overhang off a barn to a clump of trees.



Maintain their hooves properly. Hooves should be trimmed every six weeks, but may be more often in the rains. Foot rot is a specific problem to sheep and goats. Especially animals walking on damp or wet ground. Softer hooves make it easier for bacteria to penetrate. Foot rot can cause severe pain and lameness and usually stays in the pasture around 12 days. Separate infected sheep, pare the hoof to remove excess horn and apply antiseptic agents.

WORMS... Zimbabwean producers have traditionally commenced regular treatment of worms at the onset of the rains, without justifying the reason for treatment, wasting time and money. Rather treat if the worm infestation is sufficiently high to justify the cost. Conducting faecal egg counts give the producer a reliable indication of worm infestations.

Collect fresh faeces from 10 selected animals from each age/breeding group, place in separate labelled plastic bags. Refridgerate until submitted to a diagnostic laboratory. Results are usually quick and reasonably priced.

You should not be allowing your sheep to drink DAM water, or grazing against a dam, due to worm infestation.

HAPPY SHEEP, AND HAPPY SHEPHERDS, go together like lamb chops and fine wine! Tend your sheep in a manner that allows them to be the effective, profitable producers, and you to, will be happy in return.

Its Mango season so here's a recipe

FAST SWEET AND SOUR LAMB CHOPS

4 lamb chops, 3 tablespoons Mango Chutney, 2 teaspoons prepared mustard, ½ teaspoon mixed herbs. Salt to taste.

Put chops in a roasting tin with a cover Mix sauce ingredients, chopping mango pieces if too large. Pour half of the sauce over the chops – cover Roast in moderate oven for 15 minutes Turn chops over and pour rest of sauce over them

Cover and cook 10 to 15 minutes more. If sauce becomes too sticky moisten with a bit of water.
