EARLY MAIZE MARKETING UPDATE

The ZNFU had a follow up meeting with the Minister of Agriculture and the Permanent Secretary on Wednesday 8th April 2020 in the afternoon on the early maize marketing arrangements.

Farmers should take note that 57,754MT of the early maize will be bought through the Tripartite contract based on the Millers local requirements. A market for the rest of the early maize which is not needed locally will be created through immediate export arrangements by participating millers purchasing it.

The local market is said to be getting rainfed maize already and this has reduced demand for the early maize locally. Preparation of tripartite contracts by the Food Reserve Agency (FRA) is in motion and the Union will continue to communicate with farmers.

Further, ZNFU will begin to engage the millers on the export arrangements. Farmers should note that all the quantities declared as ready for supply in April have been allocated to participating millers and what is remaining is availing the contracts to farmers for signing and delivery can go on.

Therefore, there is need for farmers to ensure that the harvesting and drying is completed within the agreed period for both local sales and exports. Further information can be obtained from your area grain representative or the Secretariat.

COVID-19: ANOTHER TWO WEEKS OF PREVENTIVE MEASURES

President Edgar Lungu has extended the period to observe preventive COVID-19 measures by a further two weeks in an enhanced bid to combat the spread of the world pandemic.

Making the pronouncement Thursday 9th April 2019, President Lungu said arising from the successes scored during the last two weeks, he would extend of the current measures and future decisions would depend on how the pandemic is going to evolve. The Head of state also announced another set of behavioural conduct to be adhered to apart from those stated a fortnight ago.

The new measures include;

(1) All citizens are advised to ensure that they wear face masks at all times, particularly,





in public places such as markets, buses, bus- stops and shopping malls;

(2) All citizens are reminded to practice high levels of personal hygiene like washing or sanitising hands frequently;

(3) All citizens are reminded to cover their mouths with a flexed elbow when coughing;

(4) All citizens are reminded to use tissue when sneezing and carefully dispose it off in a bin;

(5) All citizens are reminded to avoid touching their faces and shaking hands;

(6) All citizens are reminded to observe social distancing every time and everywhere while limiting movements.

The President has called on everyone to "please stay home in order to stay safe".

The measures announced two weeks ago include;

- Social distancing
- Avoiding Public gatherings of more than 50 people
- Shutting down Cinemas
- Closing of Gymnasiums
- Closing of Night clubs
- Closing of Bars
- Closing of Casinos
- Restuarants to be servicing take away food only
- All international airports to remain closed except for Kenneth Kaunda International Airport

And President Lungu has revealed that 17 patients have been discharged and out of 82 tests conducted in the last 24 hours, no new positive cases have been reported in the last 24 hours.

He said a total number of Covid-19 cases recorded in Zambia remain at 39, with one death, 24 discharges. Currently 14 patients are admitted, among them two on the Copperbelt.

He said all patients under quarantine or isolation are stable except for a 74 year old man whose condition has been unstable.





GOVT RELEASES K2.5 BILLION AS COVID-19 THREAT CONTINUES

President Edgar Lungu has revealed that government has released K2.5 billion in view of the current impact of Covid-19 on the economy to reduce domestic arrears owed to domestic suppliers of goods and services.

He said the money also includes the reduction on outstanding arrears to pensioners under public service pension fund and retirees who are claimants under the ministry of justice.

The President said this money will also reduce outstanding third-party arrears and other employee-related commitments. President Lungu said other measures are;

- 1. Government has released K140 million to pay local contractors in the road sector. These resources will ensure that Zambian contractors and suppliers are not thrown out of business
- 2. Government has removed provisions of Statutory Instrument no. 90 relating to the claim of VAT on imported spare parts, lubricants and stationery;
- 3. Further the Bank of Zambia has taken measures to encourage use of digital financial services and mobile transaction services.

5.The Bank of Zambia has provided a K10 billion line of credit to banks that may face liquidity challenges and revoked statutory instrument for classification and provisioning of loans.

He has directed the Minister of Finance to ensure priority is given to small and medium scale enterprises (SMEs) that are adversely affected by the impact of the Covid-19.

He said the benefits of this move should go to businesses such as schools, gymnasiums, restaurants, bars, and nightclub owners whose businesses have been halted and have sent their workers home.





The President said commercial banks are obliged to give them loans at an affordable rate to enable their businesses to survive.

IMPORTED PROCESSED MEATS WORRY PROF. LUO

Minister of Fisheries and Livestock Honourable Professor Nkandu Luo says she is concerned with the importation of processed foods and the impact this could have on people's health.

Speaking during a stakeholders' meeting convened by the Minister of Finance to thrash out the supply of agro products by local producers and importation of the said commodities by chain stores amid COVID 19, Professor Luo said Zambians should be concerned with what they consume as this has a telling effect on their health in the long run.

She said cold meats, especially that which has been kept frozen for a long time, could cause health complications to people that consume it.

Professor Luo says a lot of thought has to go towards the importation and use of products that may be used to produce some local foods as well, saying they should undergo serious scrutiny and tests before being approved for consumption.

LAKE KARIBA LEVELS REACH 19.8%

The Lake level has continued rising steadily.

According to the Zambezi River Authority (ZRA) the Lake Kariba closed the period under review at 478.34m (19.80% usable storage) on 9th April 2020. Last year on the same date, the Lake level was much higher at 480.50m (35.56% usable storage).

The Kariba Lake is designed to operate between levels 475.50m and 488.50m (with 0.70m freeboard) for hydropower generation.


